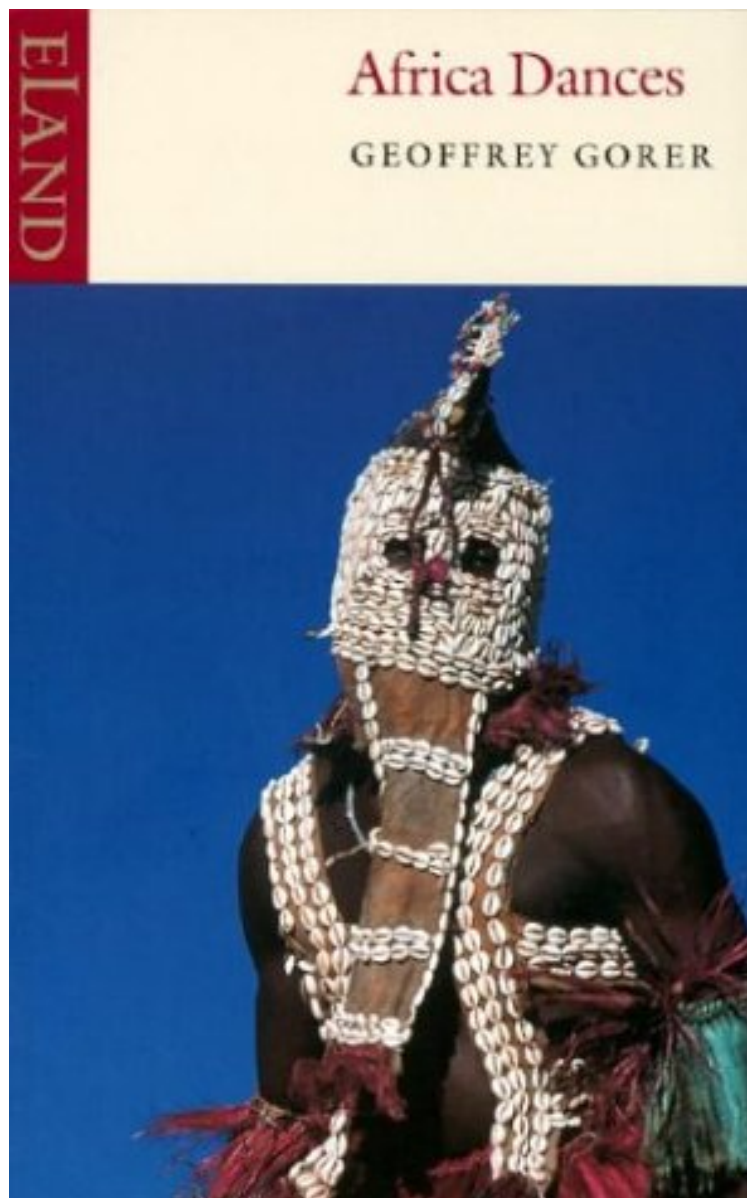

Travelogue of African dance research in the 1930'sBy jeanne christophersonGorer (who ultimately spoke 12 languages) accompanied a famed Senegalese dancer who was performing in Paris on a dance research journey through West Africa, ostensibly to gather material and recruit dancers

for a company in Paris. This is one of the first books I've found by a European of that era that speaks admiringly and respectfully of African culture and describes accurately the scourge of colonialism. Fascinating stories. Gorer does apologize at the end for some of his early prejudices, as he slowly "gets" the amazing role that music, dance and religion play in the intimate lives of the communities they tour. The vision of a dance company was ended by the Nazi chapter of European history, but was finally realized in the 1960's when African nations used their independence to create touring companies to publicize and share their rich performance traditions. Africa dances is an amazing eye witness account of a formative period of history in Africa, well written and perceptive. It was Gorer's first look at Africa, in the company of a friend he met performing in Paris in the 1930's, and accomplished African dancer (male) performing at the Folies Berger (spelling), (sort of like the Ziegfeld Follies). Their intention was to view dances in different parts of West Africa, starting in Senegal, and recruit a company. In the 1930's. This is a travelogue, as well as an indictment of destructive colonial policies of the time. A must read.
