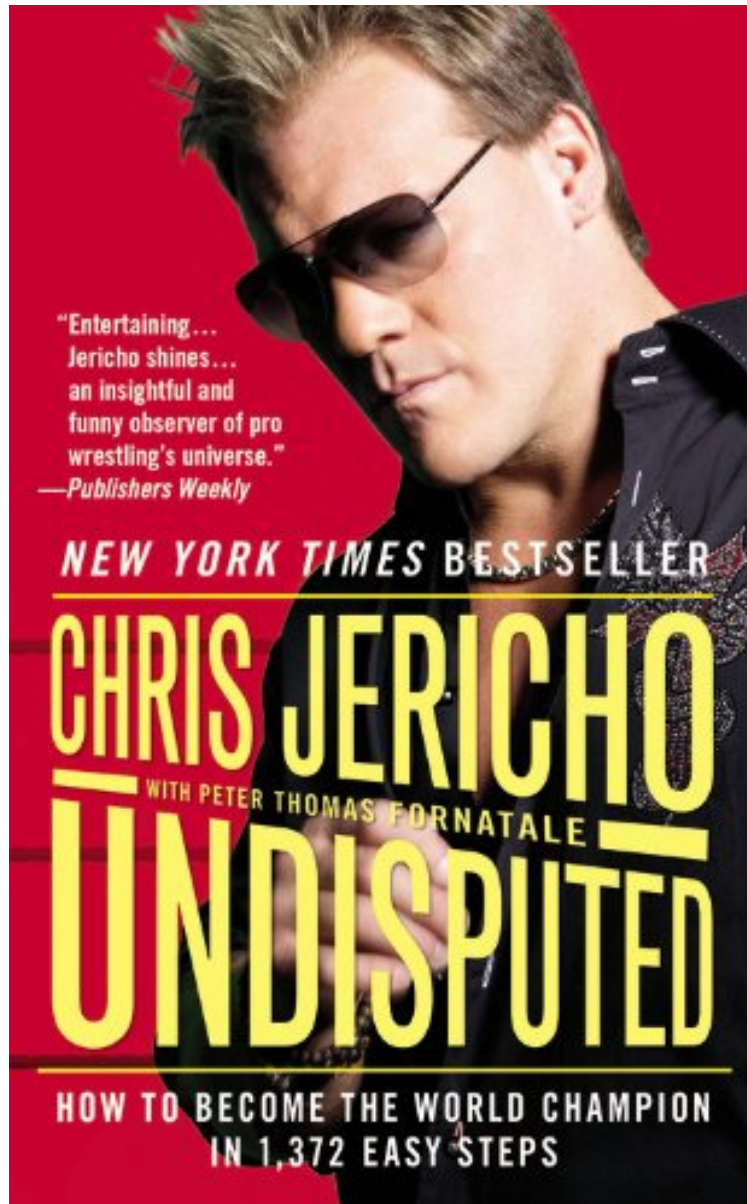

There is a bit more personality in this one and some funny stories. I love the insight about his band Fozzy and some looks behind the scenes in dealings with Vince McMahon. He gives great details about matches and storylines. One thing that is annoying is that he talks like he is God's gift to wrestling and then proceeds to talk about matches that didn't go over well or where he straight screwed up. I guess you have to appreciate the honesty and I think his point is that it made him grow to become a better performer. Another thing that can be annoying is that he has to parenthetically editorialize when he uses big words. Otherwise, this is a great, entertaining read and I would purchase his other two books that come after this one.

He talks a lot about the hardships he encountered when realizing that WCW operated a lot less structured than WWE. I found the book to be very humorous, as was the first, with his metal references throughout and side bars indicating that Mick Foley has never beaten him. While most people will buy this with his wrestling career in mind, the book also serves as a reminder of how harsh the music industry is, as Chris covers his time in Fozzy from playing to empty clubs to playing huge festivals. There is also a really cool story about Axl Rose randomly appearing and hanging with Jericho and crew one night that was very interesting. Something I like about Chris' writing is he's not afraid to call things as they happened, and isn't afraid of crushing egg shells with people, and isn't worried about painting a pretty picture of everyone to keep a job. I appreciated his honesty in describing moments with McMahon that had favorable and unfavorable outcomes. One of things I did pick up is the book has a tone to it when describing Chris Benoit, which he has a whole chapter dedicated to, Chris acknowledges the incident, but at the same time wants to remind the readers of all his friend accomplished, and not let Benoit's entire life be summed up by the murder/suicide. It's a great reminder that aside from the end, Benoit did have a lot of heart for wrestling. Great book, I recommend it for anyone who's a wrestling or metal fan

His writing is no different as he feels as if he is simply conversing with his reader throughout the book. Jericho has a lot of insight about the business and his experience with it, so much of what he says is illuminating about his time with the WWE. He's not afraid to lay out the reality of his career as he saw it and at times, it's strange to see how he felt about his career against how the fans perceived him. You really get a sense of Jericho the man as opposed to Jericho the character and his drive to be one of the best. That said, this is not a book exclusively about his wrestling career. As most Jericho fans will know, he is part of a group called Fozzy and much of the book focuses on the growth of his heavy metal band and his exposure to the business. We're exposed to Jericho's honesty about his life, his habits, and his mistakes which makes him appear more human. While I personally found the entire book compelling, wrestling fans may not care too much about the Fozzy sections. Overall, a good read, albeit a quick one. Worth it a discounted price.
