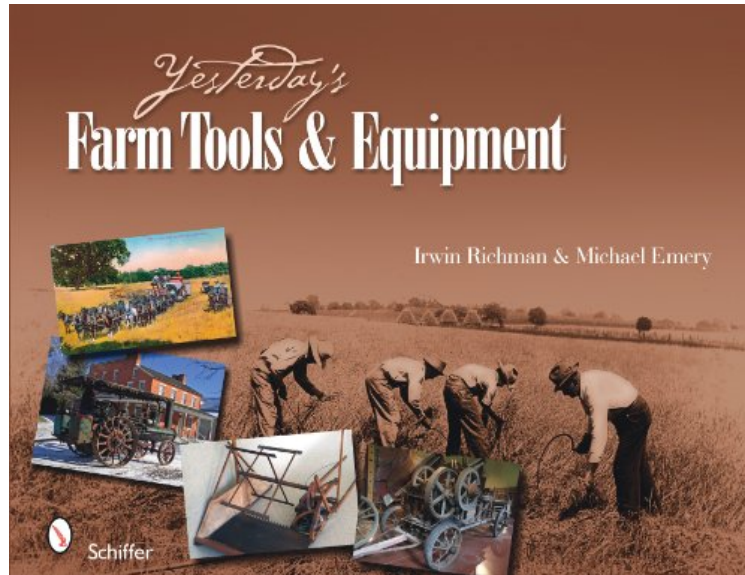

Most likely, some of what I saw dated from Great Depression days. Given that background, it's not surprising how enchanted I was at discovering YESTERDAY'S FARM TOOLS EQUIPMENT. Published by Schiffer Publishing in 2010, Michael Emery and Irwin Richman's wonderful book is an evocative trip back to the early days of farming.Utilizing over 600 color photographs and vintage illustrations, YESTERDAY'S FARMS TOOLS EQUIPMENT depicts farming life as it was circa 1850-1918. In a series of chapters on Farming and Tools; Pastures, Meadows and Haying; Grains and Potatoes; Tobacco; Orchards; Market Gardens and Poultry; etc., Emery and Richman describe that aspect of farm life and illustrate the various tools and techniques associated with it. Many of the items featured have been preserved at the Landis Valley Museum in Lancaster, Pennsylvania and, judging from what's found in the book, the museum itself must be fabulous.I wish I had had this book 50 years ago when I was wandering around my uncle's farm! Perhaps then I would have know that odd wooden instrument in the corner wasn't a grain seeder, a clover huller or an apple peeler but a dog treadmill!In short, if you're interested in America's farming past, you'll love YESTERDAY'S FARM TOOLS EQUIPMENT. Hundreds of old farm tools and equipment are shown to be echoes of America's past, as farming remains vital to the economy today. Major chapters cover old haying, grains, tobacco, orchards, poultry, dairy, horses and mules in farm practices. Over 600 vintage and modern photos display the amazing variety of gadgets once necessary for farming. These objects are preserved in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, at the Landis Valley Museum, where they help to interpret American farm life of the 18th, 19th, and 20th centuries. This book extends the reach of the museum's collections to interested people worldwide.

He works with the interpretive staff of the Landis Valley Museum and runs the Vintage Seed Project, as one of his interests. Michael B.
